#### **WISCONSIN CONTEST RULES:**

- 1. Individuals must be currently enrolled in the 4-H Dog Project in the county they represent.
- 2. Subjects must be dog related, original, and factual. Use of live animals is not permitted.
- 3. Participants are expected to do a presentation, of one of these two types:
  - a) Demonstrate horse-related procedure by explanation and doing the procedure (or facsimile of procedure). Visual aids may also be used.
  - b) Explain what is involved in horse-related topics by use of props and/or visuals.
- 4. Senior presentations should be 9-12 minutes in length. Three points will be deducted from the total score for every minute (or fraction of a minute) under the time limit.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then the judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
  - b) Youth will be permitted 5 minutes to set-up their presentation and 5 minutes to clean-up.
- 5. Beginner and junior presentations should be no longer than 10 minutes.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then the judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
  - b) Youth will be permitted 5 minutes to set-up their presentation and 5 minutes to clean-up.
- Contestants must introduce themselves by name, county (or state, when applicable) and demonstration title.
- 7. Contestants must cite their major references after the conclusion of their presentation. This will not be counted in the allotted time.
- 8. Only the judge(s) may ask questions of the contestant in the contest. Question time will not count in the allotted time. Contestants should repeat the question, then answer it.
- 9. Ties will be broken first by the judge's accumulated delivery score, second by the judge's accumulated organization score, and third on the judge's accumulated content and accuracy score.
- 10. Creative audiovisual aids may be used, but the contestants must be involved in making or designing them.
- 11. See Judging Guide for additional information.
- 12. A grand, reserve and 8 top ribbons in each division will be awarded. Disqualified entries are NOT eligible for awards but will be critiqued by judge with reason for disqualification listed on judge's form.

- 2. Subjects must be dog related, original, and factual. Use of live animals is not permitted.
- 3. Participants are expected to do a presentation, of one of these two types:
  - a) Demonstrate horse-related procedure by explanation and actually doing the procedure (or facsimile of procedure). Visual aids may also be used.
  - b) Explain what is involved in horse-related topic by use of props and/or visuals.
- 4. Senior presentations should be 10-15 minutes in length. Three (3) points will be deducted from the score for every minute or fraction of a minute you are under time.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
  - b) Youth will be permitted 5 minutes to set-up their presentation and 5 minutes to clean-up.
- 5. Beginner and Junior presentations should be no longer than 10 minutes.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then the judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
  - b) Youth will be permitted 5 minutes to set-up their presentation and 5 minutes to clean-up.
- 6. Contestants must introduce themselves by name, county (or state, when applicable) and presentation title.
- 7. Contestants must cite their major references after the conclusion of their presentation. This will not be counted in the allotted time.
- 8. Only the judge(s) may ask questions of the contestants in the contest. Question time will not count in the allotted time. Contestants should repeat the question, then answer it.
- 9. Ties will be broken first by the judge's accumulated delivery score, second by the judge's accumulated organization score, and third on the judge's accumulated content and accuracy score.
- 10. Creative audiovisual aids may be used, but the contestants must be involved in making and designing them. All visual aids, prep, and equipment (including computer/LCD) are the responsibility of the presenter.

- 12. A grand, reserve and top eight ribbons in each division will be awarded. Disqualified entries are NOT eligible for awards but will be critiqued by judge with reason for disqualification listed on judge's form.

### PUBLIC SPEAKING CONTEST - INFORMATIVE SPEECH

To help youth gain self-confidence, courage and persuasiveness. To share ideas with others. To develop the ability to speak in public. To inform others about horse related subjects and/or the 4-H Dog programs.

#### **GRADE DIVISIONS:**

Beginner 3-5 Junior 6-8 Senior 9-13

#### WISCONSIN CONTEST RULES:

- 1. The subject must pertain to dogs. Speeches not appropriately related to the dogs may be disqualified at the discretion of the judge.
- 2. Individuals must be enrolled in the 4-H Dog Project in the county they represent.
- 3. Brief notes may be used, but demonstration materials and visual aids are not permitted.
- 4. A public address (microphone) system will not be used during the contest. A podium will NOT be reserved. If one is available in the room, contestants have the option of using it.
- 5. Senior speeches should be 7-10 minutes in length. Three points will be deducted from the total score for every minute (or fraction of a minute) under the time limit.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then the judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
- 6. Beginner and Junior speeches have a 7 minute maximum time limit.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then the judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
- 7. Contestant is to provide the following information: introduce themselves by name, county (or state when applicable) and title of the speech. This can be done verbally or by handing the Judge a card with the information.
- 8. Contestants should cite their major references after the conclusion of their speech. Time for citing references will not be counted in the allotted time.
- 9. Only the judge may ask questions of the contestant. Question time will not be counted in the allotted time. Contestants should repeat the question and then answer it.
- 10. Ties will be broken first by accumulated delivery score, second by accumulated organizational score, and third by accumulated content and accuracy score.
- 11. See Public Speaking Judging Guide for additional information.
- 12. A grand, reserve and top eight ribbons in each division will be awarded. Disqualified entries are NOT eligible for awards but will be critiqued by judge with reason for disqualification listed on judges form.

#### **WISCONSIN CONTEST RULES:**

- 1. The reading must pertain to dogs. The reading may be an original work of the exhibitor.
- 2. Reading may be prose, poetry, stories, play cuttings, narratives, book or review.
- 3. Interpretive reading is the art of reading aloud from the printed page.
- 4. The selection should NOT be memorized.
- 5. A public address system will not be used during the contest. Use of a podium is optional.
- Your reading should be copied on paper and mounted on construction paper instead of reading out of a book.
- 7. Props and costumes are not used.
- 8. Contestants should have an opening that includes your name, age, and county. It should also include the title and author of the selection and an introduction (transition to reading).
- 9. Senior readings should be 7-10 minutes in length. Three points will be deducted from the total score for every minute (or fraction of a minute) under the time limit.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then the judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
- 10. Beginner or Junior readings have a 7 minute maximum time limit.
  - a) Judge will allow the presentation to go over by a maximum of 1 minute. Then the judge will call time and assess a 10 point time penalty.
- 11. Ties will be broken first by accumulated score of points 5-8 on the judging guide, second by accumulated score of 2-4, and third by point 9.
- 12. See Public Speaking Judging Guide for additional information.
- 13. A grand, reserve and top eight ribbons in each division will be awarded. Disqualified entries are NOT eligible for awards but will be critiqued by judge with reason for disqualification listed on judges form.

# 4-H Online 2.0 Event Registration Guide

**Updated 2023** 

Whether you are a new or returning family\*, this guide will help you register for an event in Wisconsin 4-H. Please read this page for a summary of the steps needed to enroll.

\* Family can be a household or a recognized outside group (classroom, partner organization, etc.).

### Find the Event

Either click on the provided link or type the link into your browser. The link will be similar to https://<eventname>.4honline.com where <eventname> might be wi4hartscamp2023, 23wi4hhorseconference, 23wi4hdco, or 23wi4hartteam.

In this guide, the 2023 Wisconsin 4-H Horse Conference will be used as an example event.

You will see information about the event such as the dates of the event at the top and the different registration types listed at the bottom. Along with the registration types are the costs and deadlines for each category.


Click the Register button to start the registration process.



# Login to Event


You have two options for logging in.

- 1. If you are a new family or a returning family, you can enter your email address and click on the Send Email button to get an link to log in emailed to you. If you are an existing family, make sure you use the same email address as your family login in 4-H Online.
- 2. If you already have a family account in 4-H Online, you can click on "Or Login" and enter your family login email and passwor



### Logged Into The Event

After you are logged into the event, you will see a screen similar to the image below. If the event allows non-enrolled members to register for the event, you will see the Register New Member section on the left side. If you must be an enrolled 4-H member to register for the event, the Register New Member section will not be visible.




If you want to register an existing family member for the event, click on Register next to the member's name in the list on the right. Skip to Registering for an Event on page 4.

If you want to add a new family member to register for the event, continue to the next section.

## Adding a New Member to the Family

- Enter the person's First Name, Last Name, and Birth Date, then click on the Create And Register button.
- 2. Double check the information on the window that appears and if everything is accurate, click the Create And Register button.



### Registering for an Event


- 1. You will then be asked to select the registration type you wish to register for.
- 2. Click the Register button for the type you are selecting.



- 3. Depending on the age of the person being added, there are some demographic questions to be answered. These are for statistical purposes and emergency contacts. Only the questions with the red "required" need to be answered. For most of them, there is a "Prefer Not To State" option.
- 4. When done, click on the Next button at the bottom.
- 5. You will see a progress timeline across the top to show where you are in the registration process.



- 6. Answer the questions on the Questions page and then click on **Next**.
- If there is a health form required, you will be asked to complete the form during registration. Click on Next when done.
- 8. If there are any consents to be signed they will appear next. Complete each item and then click on **Next**.
- On the Payment screen, if paying by Credit Card is enabled for the event, you will be able to enter credit card information or you can click on Pay By
   Check. Click this button and then confirm you are paying by check. Click on the Next button.
- On the Confirm screen, you will see a summary of your registration. Click the Finish button to submit the event registration.



11. The event registration has now been submitted. Watch your email for messages as the registration moves along the acceptance process.

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
